"Deceitful Kisses"

Text: Proverbs 27:6

Intro:

- ➤ What we have contrasted in our verse is the difference between a faithful friend and an enemy.
- A faithful friend will sometimes will do or say something to us that will be unpleasant and described in our verse as a wound.
 - o However, the motive behind the faithful friend's action is not one of hurt but help.
 - o A faithful friend will point out things about ourselves that may not be pleasant to hear but will help you in the long run.
 - o That is exactly what a pastor does with his preaching.
 - o He rebukes his hearers sometimes because he a faithful friend.
 - o Oh, it may smart sometimes but if he really loves his people then he will do it when it is needed to help his folks grow in the things of the Lord.
 - o The pastor is to give you both good and the bad according to the Word of God.
 - o He is to give you the whole counsel of God.
- > On the other hand someone who is your enemy will try to deceive you that they are your friend by giving you a kiss and hug.
 - o You know that type that I mean allowing smiling in your face while they are stabbing you in the back.
 - o Our churches are filled with people like that.
- > Our study is entitled "**Deceitful Kisses**"
 - o I want us to look at some kisses in the Bible that were meant to deceive their recipients.

I. The Kiss of an Adulteress - Proverbs 7:13

> Read Proverbs 7:10-23

o Appearance

- v. 13 The adulteress gives the man a kiss.
- She reassures him everything is going to be all right.
- **v. 14** She has even been to church and prayed about it, paid her vows.
- She says that she is right with God.
- v. 15 She tells him that she has looking for a man like him.
- **vs. 16-17** She tells him that she has made everything ready for their night of romance and love.
- **v. 18** She tells him "Baby, we are going to have a good time"
- **vs. 19-20** She tells him that we don't have to rush because my husband is away on business and won't be home for sometime.
- **v. 21** She tells him everything that he wants to hear.
- vs. 22-23 Shows the man was totally deceived and took the bait.

o **Deceit**

- The truth is that everything will not be all right.
- The wages of sin is death.
- Adultery brings destruction
- Read verses 24-27 -Shows the result of falling for the deceit of the adulteress' kiss.

II. The Kiss of Absalom - 2 Samuel 15:5

> Read 2 Samuel 15:1-6

o Appearance

- **vs. 2-3** Absalom is appearing to show genuine concern for the people of Israel.
- **v. 4** Absalom assures the people if he were in charge that things would be done fairly.
- Indicating that he father David as unfair in his dealings.

Deceit

- **vs. 5-6** Provides the truth in the matter.
- Absalom's motive was to steal the hearts of the people.
- To get rid of his father and become king of Israel.

III. The Kiss of Laban - Genesis 29:13

> Read Genesis 29:9-14

Appearance

- Jacob sent by his father, Isaac to his mother, Rebekah's brother Laban to find a wife - See Genesis 28:1-2.
- vs. 9-11 Rachel and Jacob meet.
- v. 11 Jacob greets Rachel with a kiss.
- After all they are cousins.
- **v. 12** Rachel runs home and tells Laban her father that she has met his sister's son or his nephew.
- v. 13 Laban runs to meet Jacob.
- He greets Jacob with an embraced and a kiss and takes him home.
- So, it appears that Laban is happy to see Jacob.

o Deceit

- vs. 15-18 Laban uses Jacob.
- Laban deceives Jacob into thinking if he works for Laban seven years that he will get to marry Rachel who he loves.
- Laban tricks him with giving him Leah his oldest daughter.
- Jacob ends up serving Laban another seven years for Rachel.

IV. The Kiss of Joab - 2 Samuel 20: 9-10

o Appearance

Read 2 Samuel 20:9

- Joab greets Amasa.
- He inquires about his health and calls him brother.
- Joab makes like he going kiss Amasa.
- So, on the surface it does not appear that Joab is upset with Amasa for not assembling the men Judah at the appointed time that he was ordered by King David.

o **Deceit**

Read 2 Samuel 20:10

- While Joab is appearing to kiss him, he stabs Amasa in the fifth rib and kills him.
- Christians do the same thing in churches.
- They smile in your face, greet you with an embrace and tell you what a great message that was you preached.
- At the same time stab you in the back with their wicked and unruly tongue.

V. The Kiss of Job - Job 31:27

> Appearance

- o Here in Chapter 31, Job is defending his integrity with God.
- Read Job 31:24-28
- o Job is saying if he had placed his confidence in gold.
- o Rejoiced in what he had accomplished.
- o If he had given himself credit for all that he had accomplished then he has committed iniquity for denying the God above.
- o And should be judged and punished for it.

> Deceit

- o Read Job 31:27
- o What Job is saying in **v. 27** is that we can deceive ourselves into thinking what we have obtained we did it without God.
- o Then we become so prideful and think we are so great as illustrated by kissing one's hand.
- In other words having the attitude, "I am so wonderful, so marvelous, so great!"
- So, the deceitful kiss here would be in deceiving yourself that you something great without God and you are not! See John 15:5

VI. The Kiss of Judas - Matthew 26:48-49

- Mark 14:45-44
- Luke 22:47-48
- The most tragic deceitful kiss of them all.

> Appearance

- o The kiss of Judas was so suppose to appear as if Judas loved Jesus and was a friend of his,
- o One of his disciples.
- o Not to be afraid to be associated with Him.

> Deceit

- o The kiss of Judas was a kiss of betrayal.
- o The kiss was a sign to identify Jesus to those who were coming to arrest him.
- o Very tragic indeed.
- o Judas kissed the Door to Heaven and died and went to hell.

Conclusion

- ➤ We have seen the deceitful kisses of the enemy and what they can do to deceive their recipients.
- > The kiss of the adulteress to bring a man to destruction and down to hell.

- > The kiss of Absalom to steal the heart of people and dethrone his father, King David.
- > The kiss of Laban to trick Jacob into working for him 14 years and prospering greatly at his hands.
- The kiss of Joab that led to murder.
- > The kiss of Job as a result of pride.
- > The kiss of Judas that caused our Lord his life and sent Judas to hell.
