Give Us a King (1 & 2) 1 Sam. 8:4-20

Readings: 2 Cor. 6:14-7:1, 1 Sam. 8:4-20 Matt. 16:13-21

INTRODUCTION:

Maybe more than two parts; Intro in AM, Part I in PM; divide Part II over several PMs if necessary (get another reading).

- 1. 1 Cor. 10:11-12, the examples of disobedience under the OT.
 - a. Written for our learning, an example.
 - b. "...Let him who thinks he stands take heed lest he fall."
- 2. This lesson, in two parts, will explore...
 - a. Wanting innovations to God's plan.
 - b. Rejecting God and His plans.
- Israel did it when they wanted a king like the nations around them.
- 4. We can reject God and His ways when we ask, "Give us a King like the nations (or the denominations) around us."

BODY: Give Us a King (I)
I. Israel's Wants: a King

A. History

- 1. God took Israel from slavery and made a covenant with them at Mt. Sinai.
 - a. God was their King.
 - b. He defeated kings: Pharaoh, Og (Bashan), Sihon (Heshbon), and others.
 - c. Later many kings upon entering Canaan; 31 listed in Josh. 12.
- Instruction on selecting a king (Deut. 17:14-17).
- 3. Seemingly attempts to establish men as a king over Israel:
 - a. Moses viewed as king (Deut. 33:1-5).
 - b. Abimelech made king over men of Shechem and Beth-millo (Jud. 9:6); reigned three years (v. 22).
- 4. Days of the Judges
 - a. Seeking what was right in man's eyes
 - (1) Gave up on God as King.
 - (2) Sought their own devices (Jud. 17:6).
 - b. Two wicked judges, Samuel's sons (1 Sam.
 8:1-3).
 - (1) Joel
 - (2) Abijah
 - (3) Makes you wonder that corrupt leaders come from corrupt people.

- 5. The actions of Samuel's sons brought on the revolt, where the people wanted a king (1 Sam. 8:4-6).
- B. This too was a rejection of God and His ways (1 Sam. 8:7-8).
 - God, through Samuel warned what would come of such a king (1 Sam. 8:10-18).
 - 2. Israel still wants a king (1 Sam. 8:19-22).
 - a. they wanted a king
 - b. they wanted to be like "all the
 nations..."
 - c. A King:
 - (1) to judge them, go out before them, and fight their battles
 - (2) God had done all this before
 - (a) Judged them according to His law.
 - (b) Went before them as a pillar of fire and a cloud of smoke
 - (c) Fought their battles, such as Jericho
- II. What Did They Get When They Got Saul?
 - A. NOTE: Saul was not ALL bad.
 - He was the Lord's anointed.
 - 2. He did fight battles and set up altars.
 - 3. He apparently raised a fine son, Jonathan.
 - B. They got a good looking king--outwardly (1 Sam. 9:1-2).
 - 1. They, like us, want something that has a good appearance.
 - Remember Eve saw the forbidden fruit was good to look at.
 - C. They got a sense of "renewal" when Saul won a battle (1 Sam. 11:14-15).
 - 1. We get excited over something new.
 - 2. Wait until the newness wears off.
 - Careful: something else "new" will come along.
 - D. They got a king who lead the people in sin by sacrifice (1 Sam. 13:1-14).
 - 1. Fighting the Philistines.
 - Waited for Samuel to come and offer the sacrifice.
 - 3. Saul offered the burnt offering, not Samuel (v. 9-12).
 - E. They got a king who lost the kingdom (1 Sam. 13:13-14).
 - 1. They got a king who acted foolishly.
 - Saul was not a man after God's heart, probably seeking more his own ends.
 - They got a king who did not keep what the Lord had commanded--much like the people themselves.
 - F. They got a king who led the people to disobey God; the Amalekites (1 Sam. 15).
 - God's plan was to utterly destroy Amalek as a nation: it's peoples, and animals (v. 2-3).

- 2. Saul led the people to defeat Amalek.
- 3. Saul and the people spared king Agag and the best of the flocks (v. 8-9).
- 4. The Lord's regret (vs. 11).
- 5. This "mercy" was actually rebellion and disobedience before God (vs. 21-23).
- 6. Saul's sin
 - a. confessed (v. 24-25).
 - b. the kingdom torn from Saul (v. 26-28); given to David.
 - c. Saul still wanted the respect of those whom he led (v. 30).
- G. They got a king who lost contact with God.
 - 1. Samuel would not speak to Saul any more (1 Sam. 15:34-35).
 - 2. God did not answer Saul, who had priviously been inspired (1 Sam. 28:6).
 - 3. Saul consulted with a spirit medium (1 Sam. 28:3-25).
 - a. Good point: had removed the mediums and spiritists (v. 3).
 - b. Bad point: in disguise, he consulted a medium (vs. 7-19).
 - Saul promised no punishment, though, as king, he was to enforce God's law against sorcery.
 - (2) Do we consult the mediums? astrology? palmists? gazers? TV-psychics? Are you seeking the future when you eat your "fortune" cookie?
 - (3) Cf. Queens and Kings, Presidents who do the same.
 - c. Samuel appeared to the woman, reaffirming the kingdom was torn from Saul and given to David (v. 17).
- H. They got a king who died a humiliating death (1 Sam. 31).
 - 1. Losing a battle against the Philistines. $\!\Box$
 - a. Israel's soldiers forced to flee (v. 1).
 - b. Sons Jonathan, Abinadab and Malachi-shua killed (v. 2).
 - 2. Saul and his armor bearer (v. 3-5).
 - a. Saul injured by archers.
 - b. Saul took his life.
 - c. Armor bearer did likewise.
 - 3. Saul's body displayed by the enemy (v. 9-13).
 - a. Decapitated.
 - b. Weapons sent throughout the land of the Philistines.
 - c. His body fastened to a wall.
 - d. Finally buried by some valiant men.
 - e. Saul's dishonor was the nations' dishonor.

- I. Israel left God for a King who Left God.
 - 1. Their choice was a reject of God.
 - Their king was not a man after God's own heart.

III. Why we may want.

- A. We are not near to the beginning of our salvation experience.
 - 1. We are generations from the time of Jesus.
 - 2. We are generations from the time of the Apostles.
 - We are generations from the time of miracles and spiritual gifts.
 - 4. We are generations from the time of inspiration, and the giving of the NT.
- B. Rejecting God's plan leaves us like sheep without a shepherd.
 - We will look for something to fill the void.
 - We are likely to turn from God's way when it does not seem relevant to us.
 - We really need to seek God's way, but instead we seek things like the "nations" around us.
 - a. We too might say, "Give us a king...."b. We're really saying give us something else, Lord.

CONCLUSION PART ONE:

According to time, perhaps continue into second lesson, "I. A God Like the Nations Around Us."

- 1. More to come, directed at us.
- Think about the lesson of warning, example, that we who think we stand should take heed lest we fall.
 - a. We can become unhappy with God and His revealed ways.
 - b. We can come up with innovations replacing God's ways.
 - c. AND God will let us go that way to destruction.
- Jesus is God's way, truth, life (John 14:6).
 - a. No one comes to the Father except through Jesus.
 - b. We'd better have the right "king" Jesus in our lives.
- 4. Jesus' way is: Belief and Baptism.
 - a. Have you accepted that message and obeyed Him?
 - b. Or, have you rejected the message for a message like the nations around us?

INTRODUCTION PART TWO

- 1. Review Israel's desire for a King.
- 2. Review Saul as a man not after God's own heart.
- 3. Review why WE might feel ready to bring innovations to God's way. Remind of Nadab and Abihu; Uzzah who touched the Ark.
- 4. This lesson is not about some king 3,000 years ago. It is about us in the 20th/21st Centuries.

BODY: Give Us a King (II)

- I. We may want:
 - A. A "God" Like the "Nations" Around Us.
 - A Father-in-Heaven like the nations around us.
 - a. Some Want:
 - a different God than that of the OT--too warring.
 - (2) a God of love only with no punishments.
 - (3) to believe that "we" are "gods" (New Age) and need not answer to any higher power.
 - (4) Some live like the atheist, as if there is no God (cf. Rom. 1:20-21).
 - b. We need to believe and obey:
 - (1) One God and Father of all... (Eph.
 4:6).
 - (2) God the Apostles said we must obey rather than men (Acts 5:29).
 - (3) The God who calls us to repent and who will judge all men by a man, Jesus Christ (Acts 17:30-31).
 - c. Careful lest we seek a God like the nations around us.
 - 2. A "Jesus" like the nations around us.
 - a. Some want:
 - (1) A Jesus who will not condemn anyone;
 - (a) approved everything done with a good conscience
 - (b) a "lovie-dovie" Jesus
 - (2) A Jesus who was merely a man, albeit a good man, a great philosopher.
 - (3) A Jesus who did not rise from the dead.
 - b. We need the Jesus who
 - (1) said "believe in God, believe also in Me" (John 14:1).
 - (2) who WAS raised from the dead; He is our hope (1 Cor. 15:13-14).
 - (3) offers us salvation from sins as His name implies: Jeh(ovah) saves--He will save His people from their sins (Matt. 1:21).
 - (4) is not "another Jesus" (cf. 2 Cor.
 11:4).

- c. Careful lest we seek a Jesus like the nations around us; He is the "one Lord" of Eph. 4:6.
- 3. "Holy Spirit" like the nations around us.
 - a. Some views:
 - a mystical non-being spirit behind every living thing.
 - (2) a Spirit that gives private revelations (interpretations) of Scripture as men as ask for them.
 - (3) a Spirit that causes the Pentecostal experience even today.
 - b. We may see some of these views, and tend to want to adopt them for ourselves.
 - c. We need:
 - (1) to listen to the revelation already given by the Spirit (Heb. 2:3-4).
 - (2) to be renewed by the Holy Spirit when
 we are regenerated by washing (Tit.
 3:5; cf. John 3:5, 7).
 - (3) await the resurrection of our bodies by the Spirit's power (Rom. 8:11).
 - d. We do not need another Spirit (cf. 2 Cor. 11:4).
- B. A "Bible" like the (denomi) nations around us.
 - 1. I am not talking about new translations.
 - a. But I'd say beware of paraphrases under the guise of a translation.
 - b. I would also warn against some translations--but that is not my point here.
 - c. I would also warn about many of the notes in the "study Bibles" available.
 - 2. Some have offered other "holy books":
 - a. Book of Mormon
 - b. Science and Health with a Key to the Scriptures
 - c. Koran
 - d. Bhagavad-Gita
 - e. Book of the Dead
 - f. Mahayna (Buddhist)
 - g. I Ching
 - h. Tao Te Ching
 - i. Gnostic Writings and Gospels
 - 3. Others have edited the Scriptures.
 - a. Every so often a new edited version comes around.
 - (1) Reader's Digest, leaving out many "boring" parts.
 - (2) Jesus Project with colorful notes trying to guess at what parts are Jesus or his disciples, as if none of it is inspired.
 - b. No doubt some think they are doing us a favor.

- 4. Still others offer a Creed book to establish Scripture.
 - 5. We need:
 - a. the Scriptures that equip us for every good work (2 Tim. 3:16).
 - b. the Scriptures that if handled accurately will not leave us ashamed before God (2 Tim. 2:15).
 - c. the Scriptures that contain the faith once for all delivered to the saints (Jude 3).
 - d. the Scriptures that were preached by the Apostles (1 Pet. 1:23-25), allowing some to be born again.
 - C. A "Gospel" like the (denomi) nations around
 - 1. REMEMBER: Needing another "gospel" (or any other point) is a rejection of God (cf. 1 Sam. 8:7).
 - 2. Some want/offer:
 - a. Social Gospel
 - (1) Pointing less to heaven than to heaven-on-earth.
 - (2) Making the church--as the church--the body for social changes: stop racism, feed and clothe the poor, educate children, bring hospitals to poor countries.
 - b. Faith-only Gospel
 - c. Others -can-act-to-save-us Gospel
 - (1) Parents have babies "baptized" (actually sprinkled).
 (2) Mormon "baptize" to save the dead.
 - 3. We need to preach and obey the simple gospel:
 - a. Matt. 28:18-20
 - b. Mark 16:15-16□
 - c. This is the "one faith" of Eph. 4:5
 - 4. LISTEN CAREFULLY: Gal. 1:8-9
 - a. To preach another gospel will cut you off from God.
 - b. To receive another gospel will cut you off from God.
 - c. Anathema; cut off; used as disfellowship

- D. A "Church" Like the (denomi)nations Around Us.
 - 1. Some want/have:
 - a. Many social events: avoiding financial
 disaster day; mother's day; dad's day;
 sporting teams
 - b. Special non-biblical holy days:Christmas, Ash Wednesday, Lent, Easter
 - c. Unbiblical ways of raising funds: bake sales, garage sales, running businesses, schools, bingo or other gambling events, carnivals, selling books and tapes calling funds received "donations"
 - d. Unscriptural (NT) ways of worship: instrumental music, burning incense or candles, mass as a re-sacrifice of Jesus, worship accepted if offered by a priest
 - e. Unscriptural organization: earthly headquarters, women elders (also women preachers), bishops, cardinals,
 - When we want to be like them we are leaving God's pattern for the church; we are rejecting His rule in our lives.
 - We need the church of Christ's design, that...
 - a. calls itself by terms (names) in the scriptures:
 - (1) church of God, church(es) of Christ,□
 church of the firstborn one(s), church
 of (a location; city, country)
 - (2) NOTE: even the expression "the Lord's church" is not found used in scripture, though probably implied; let us call it by scriptural expressions.
 - b. is built on Christ, not Peter (Matt. 16:18).
 - c. subject to Christ (Eph. 5:24), not making its own laws and creeds.
 - d. is pure (Eph. 5:27)
 - (1) teaching a practicing righteousness
 - (2) restoring those who are unspiritual (Gal. 6:1).
 - (3) putting some out occasionally (as per 1
 Cor. 5).
 - 4. To do otherwise is to reject God's plan, just as Israel did when selecting Saul.

- E. A "Preacher" Like the (denomi) nations around us.
 - 1. Some want:
 - a. Preacher is Pastor.
 - b. Youth or other specialty ministers
 - c. A "Charismatic" (in the new sense) Preacher.
 - (1) maybe with a great hairdo
 - d. Well liked and respected by civic leaders.
 - e. Maybe a part of the town's evangelical association of clergymen.
 - f. THEY like
 - (1) "preacheritis"
 - (2) cf. 1 Cor. 1:12, Paul, Apollos, Cephas, Christ
 - (3) Christ divided
 - 2. Need more men like
 - a. Paul
 - (1) description (2 Cor. 10:10).
 - (2) sermonizing nothing special (1 Cor. 2:1-5).
 - (3) Fools for Christ's sake (1 Cor. 4:9-14).
 - b. Oh, yes Paul was a prisoner at times! Could we support one like that?
 - c. Pray that I can be an 'imitator of Paul as he is of Christ.
- F. A "Morality" Like the Nations Around Us
 - 1. Blind to dangers of...
 - a. modern dancing
 - b. social drinking, smoking or other drug use
 - c. divorce and remarriage for "any cause"
 - d. gambling
 - e. These vices are have long been in the world, have crept into the denominations and are well on their way in the church.
 - 2. What ARE some of the vices of the "nations" (Gentiles) around us?
 - a. 1 Pet. 4:1-5
 - b. 1 Cor. 6:6-9
 - (1) IN THE CHURCH!
 - (2) shall not inherit the kingdom of God
 - 3. Situation Ethics: the new morality is the old immorality.
 - 4. We want to live like the world.
 - a. We'll have lives like the world.
 - b. We'll have churches like the world--if any at all.
 - 5. Beware of the Love of the World (1 John 2:15-17).
 - a. Beware of the world in the church while the church is in the world.
 - b. NOTE: a boat in the water is OK; water in the boat is disastrous.

- c. We need to "come out" (2 Cor. 6:14, 17).
- G. A "Hope" Like the Nations Around Us.
 - 1. Some have hope:
 - a. to retire and move to FL or Arizona.
 - b. in reincarnation, getting better karma each time through.
 - c. just to end life's weary travels
 (Sadducees?).
 - d. some have no hope (nihilism).
 - 2. Eph. 4:5 says there is one hope.
 - It is the hope of resurrection to eternal life.
 - a. hope of salvation (1 Thess. 5:8).
 - b. hope of eternal life (Tit. 1:2; 3:7).
 - c. Paul: Acts 23:6; 24:15-16
 - 4. Is this your hope?
 - a. Will you find it asking for something from the nations or denominations around us?

CONCLUSION:

- 1. We'll Be Like the Nations Around Us
 - a. We may think a different church, God, Jesus, or Morality will fight our battles for us.
 - (1) easier to convert people to Christ
 - (2) easier to keep people faithful to Christ
- 2. Those who preach a different gospel are anathema to God.
 - a. Come Out
 - b. Peculiar people, means God's own possession.
- These "Wants" Are a Rejection of God's Reign (cf. 1 Sam. 8:7).
- 4. We May Get What We Ask For.
 - a. Israel got Saul and his follies.
 - b. We may get worse; eternal punishment.
