### God Helps Those Who...

- ⇒ **Text**: Mark 10.46-52
- ⇒ Intro:
  - o The old saying 'God helps those who help themselves" is, contrary to popular opinion, not found in the Bible.
    - There are some scriptural endings to that phrase, however, in thought if not in these exact words.
    - For God helps those who -

## ⇒ I. Profess Their Need of Christ (vv. 46-47)

- o A. Bartimaeus was both blind and poor.
  - He was dependent on the compassion and charity of others for his survival.
  - Pride was a luxury he could not afford.
- o B. Bartimaeus used his remaining faculties to the utmost.
  - He could hear and speak.
  - When he heard that Jesus was coming, he cried out for his help.
- o C. Bartimaeus did not wait for complete understanding before calling on the Lord.
  - He called Jesus the "son of David," which was a true but inadequate ascription.
- D. Do not let pride, self-pity, or imperfect knowledge keep you from admitting your need of God's help in Christ.
  - For God helps those who –

# ⇒ II. Persevere in the Prayer of Faith (vv. 48-51)

- o A. Bartimaeus prayed for help.
  - True, his cry was not couched in liturgical language nor offered in a church, but it was a prayer nonetheless.
- o B. The onlookers interfered with the blind man's prayer.
  - Instead of saying "Amen" they told him to keep quiet and conduct himself in a more respect able manner in Jesus' presence.
- o C. The beggar did not let the criticism of others stop him from coming to Jesus.

- He was not concerned with what people thought of him but with obtaining God's help.
- o D. Are you persistent in your prayers?
  - Do you keep calling on the Lord until he answers, even if people call you a "fanatic" for doing so?
  - Is your faith strong enough to persevere in prayer?
  - For God helps those who -

## ⇒ III. Propose to Follow Christ in Discipleship (v. 52)

- A. Bartimaeus became a follower of Christ once his sight was restored.
  - He did not settle for mere physical healing.
- o B. Jesus' way became Bartimaeus's way.
  - Christ said, "Go thy way," but he followed Jesus.
- o C. Why do you want Christ to answer your prayers?
  - So you can follow Christ and serve him better?
  - Or are your motives selfish in wanting to use your answered prayers sinfully?

#### **⇔** Conclusion:

- o We may well say to this poor, handicapped man, "Move over, Bartimaeus.
  - Is there room on that road for me?
  - For I, too, am a blind beggar in need of the Master's healing touch."
